Rev. Marvin Williams from 2nd Baptist Church led the invocation.


In line with our goal to learn about our community and to hold our meetings at different sites in the community, Anita O'Connor, Director of LaComunidad Hispana welcomed everyone to the Center.

Mrs. O'Connor gave an overview of LaComunidad Hispana's services and emphasized that the services are available to ALL low-income members of our community.

Joan Holliday gave an overview of the framework and principles that **COMMUNITY BRIDING GENERATIONS**. They are as follows:

- 3. We each are responsible for playing a role that best matches our heart-felt energy and builds ongoing community relationships/vitality.

- 4. We will focus on and encourage processes that work on potential and positive energy.
- 5. We will keep our community interactions dynamic and all inclusive. (We will meet at different meeting sites every 6-8 weeks.)
- 6. "Coming from the heart is free". In our work to repotentialize our community (mentoring, tutoring etc.), we will add no infrastructural burden.

Jim Wilson from Mentoring Youth In Kennett (MYKE) gave an overview of the ongoing mentoring process. He spoke as "believer" that meeting with a child for 35-45 minutes a week can make a difference in helping a child develop and become an achiever. Dottie Wilson spoke to the time it takes to build trust with a child and the value that can be gained for the child and mentor. So far, twenty-two mentors have been going into Mary D Lang Schools. Starting in February, the effort will move into New Garden Elementary. MORE MENTORING VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED.

Marsha Malchione introduced three Study Buddies from The Presbyterian Church who all spoke about the value of tutoring and the meaningful experience for both the student and the tutor. They have on an average 18 students attending weekly on Monday eve from 6:30 pm to 8:00 pm.

Rev. Marvin Williams reported that The 2nd Baptist Church has had a student tutoring process going on for two years. They have on an average of 16 students attending on **Tuesday eve from 6:00 pm to 7:30 pm**. They also invite the parents in for certain events.

Mayor Charles Cramer reported that the Study Buddies at New Garden UAMEC on Linden St. meets every Wednesday afternoon from 4:00 to 6:00 pm. They had 16 students this past week.

STUDY BUDDIES NEED USED COMPUTER AND EDUCATIONAL SUPPLIES. CALL Leaders of each effort: Marsha Malchione, Rev. Marvin Williams or Mayor Cramer.)

OTHER MENTORING OPPORTUNITIES AND EXAMPLES:

Elizabeth Rhoads told us about the opportunity to be a mentor with Chester County Futures. This is a time and money commitment with one student throughout high-school and through the first year of college. The aim is to support a student in achieving a college education.

Avery Bass was introduced as a mentor of "high risk" teens.

Terry Wallace was introduced as a mentor of a teen mother who wants to move forward in a college education and life skills.

Alice Peters from the Inter-generational Literacy Tutoring reported that they have 32 Hispanic students who need help with literacy. She explained that they meet the needs of the students—which ranges from helping someone study the material for obtaining a driver's license to full literacy tutoring. She also emphasized that this process provides the opportunity for "bridging" with the Hispanic culture.

Courtney Michner a Senior Student at Kennett Square High-School is into the planning stages of setting up a process for a group of caring High School students to "bridge" with the Middle School Students around focus on their goals and staying away from drugs.

Ted Sevick from Unionville Serves will "bridge" Unionville High School Student volunteers with the Study Buddies Process.

Laura Deckman from the Kennett Area Senior Center will update the list of Seniors who will "Share Stories" with the Kennett School Students. They will provide the list for teachers who are interested in having a "Story-teller" attend one of their classes.

The seventh meeting of **COMMUNITY BRIDGING Generations** was held at WestMinster House, 210 S. Broad St. on March 4, 1998 with fifty-four community-caring members attending.

Rev. Steven Gutridge from The Presbyterian Church led the invocation.

In line with our goal to learn about our community and to hold our meetings at different sites in the community, Rev. Gutridge gave a history of the Westminster House (Utilized by several denominations before the Presbyterian Church bought it) and of the Presbyterian Church's mission and activities.

Fred and Kathryn gave a short summary of the experience they had in Mr. Hart's classroom sharing stories about the 1950s, which was the subject being studied in Social Studies. **Story-Telling** will continue to be a process CBG will encourage.

Marcia Malchione reported on the ongoing interest and spirit of Study Buddies at the Presbyterian Church on Monday evening from 6:30 to 8:00pm. Unionville Serves High School Students gave a report on 2nd Baptist Church Study Buddies held on Tuesday evening from 6:00 to 7:30 pm. They spoke about being more involved in community through this process and appreciated the sign language they were learning from Mrs. Ruth Williams. Sharon Garrick gave a report on Study Buddies at Bethel Church held on Weds. From 4:00 to 6:00 pm. Between fifteen to twenty students attend and about eight high-school students. Mrs. Equilla Boyce was representative from Bethel Church.



GUIDING PRINCIPLES:

Mt. Taber Church in Avondale expressed an interest in starting a Study Buddies. Unionville Serves as well as Kennett High School students will be linked up with these two efforts.

Gerry Zippilli from Mentoring Youth In Kennett (MYKE) reported that MYKE has moved into the New Garden Elementary. They now have seven new mentors. Mary D Lang is still operating with twenty-two mentors. Barbara DeCarlo, Principal of New Garden Elementary spoke of the value of mentoring in the schools and how the students quickly develop an ongoing relationship with their mentors.

Joan Holliday reported that Courtney Michener had met with Mr. Calhoun, Kennett Square High School Principal and was in the process of starting a mentoring effort in the Middle School with a cross-cultural team of about six.

The Kennett Square High School play, "Crazy Kamp" will be shown on April 2nd and 3rd. Melissa Merkel is looking into having a special showing for the Senior citizens whereby they will be escorted to the Kennett High by High School Students. This is their effort to continue their ongoing relationship with the Seniors after the successful Junior/Senior Prom in the fall.

Anita O'Connor will initiate an effort with Church of the Advent to explore an effort whereby Church of the Advent families would **mentor Hispanic families** in the community. The purpose would be to "bridge" the two cultures in a way that caring, understanding and integration is enhanced.

Joan Holliday announced that The Kennett Paper will provide a space for any of us to write a story about a "heart-felt" effort in Kennett Square. It would be a time to recognize the efforts and people in the community who are working on the positive and potential side of community.


David Andersen from Interact and Senior at Kennett High School will be starting a video on *Community Bridging Generations* efforts and Mayor Cramer offered to help with some of the filming.

Bill Buffington spoke about his committed interest in supporting a High Steppers Marching Team in Kennett Square. Mrs. Ruth Williams will be contacted to help organize interested youth. Inter-generational Literacy Program still needs more tutors. They are getting responses from *Community Bridging Generations* outreach.

NEW IDEAS FOR ENHANCING OUR EVOLUTION:

- 1. Study Buddies take more opportunities to "bridge" into the other Study Buddies. There are four sites with unique natures and processes. "Bridging" into other sites will help build community vitality and interactions.
- 2. Barbara DeCarlo spoke about the elementary schools having many computers that are not being used in the evening. She will explore ways to open the building up for use with supervision.
- 3. Marcia Malchione reported that Dr. Bosley, Rev. Gutridge, Joan Holliday and herself met to develop the idea and proposal for an Internet Service across all the Study Buddies, Senior Center and LaComunidad Hispana. Services and computers will be donated by community donors. The hope is to have this up and running by September of 1998.
- 4. Mayor Cramer introduced Commissioner Andrew Dinneman. The Commissioner encouraged us to organize a day event "Kennett Square Commits To Kids". On this day there is a ceremony of commitment, organizations that are presenting events, and work projects i.e. Fixing up play grounds.
- 5. Rev. Navarro spoke about the importance of learning the Spanish language to work with and welcome the Hispanics into our community.
- 6. Commissioner Dinneman spoke about 14,000 Chester County residents experiencing hunger. He encouraged us to think about getting involved in his project of growing gardens and working with farmers to provide a certain portion of food for the hungry in our county. Three high-school students signed up for involvement in this effort.
- 7. Bill Buffington announced that Unity Day will be on June 6, 1998 from 12:00pm to 5:00pm.

A Community Revival

At noon, October, 24th, Make a Difference Day, high school students from Kennett Square and Unionville, PA met with the town's mayor, the borough council president and other community members to celebrate the first ever initiative taken by youth to engender community spirit. The Volunteer Fair held the previous day was a culmination of months of work, manifested by the list of over 500 people who had volunteered to help their town. The "Chip & Dip Initiative" was born out of a desire to bridge all members and cultures of Kennett Square, and to respond to recent newspaper articles criticizing the town for its lack of spirit. Due to the enthusiastic support from local schools, organizations, the town council, and many concerned individuals, we have managed to give Kennett a boost out of its "malaise" and light a spark in the heart of the community.

The Chip & Dip Initiative was a one-day event held in the center of Kennett Square that united school students, merchants, and community members in a mutual task. Over 40 volunteer organizations gathered in the streets to set up booths displaying what they contribute to the town. Participants included the local Senior Center, the YMCA, the Hispanic community center, the Mission, the Friends' Nursing Home, and High School organizations, as well as myriad tutoring and mentoring opportunities. Each booth was equipped with information, sign-up sheets, and a distinctive combination of chips and dip.

The promise of new understanding of the community drew many people out of their homes and businesses that sunny afternoon, and relationships began to form among community members. People of all ages saw that there is a community in Kennett Square that they can be a part of, and began to form a relationship with the town. Elementary students toured the neighborhood, visiting the post office, library, police station, and even paid the mayor a surprise visit. Not only did residents stop by to investigate, but community leaders ventured from their own tables to talk with other organization representatives. The event was simply phenomenal, far surpassing the expectations of both the mayor and the core committee.

What began as an inchoate vision involved old and new community members, brought life back into the streets, and demonstrated that our youth cares about the future of Kennett Square. The eleventh meeting of *Bridging the Community* was held on November 18, 1998 at 7pm at the Kennett YMCA with forty committed members attending. Lisa Lightner from the YMCA gave us a history of the YMCA organization as well as a history of the new building. New attendees were introduced.
