Our meeting began with an invocation by Father David Benz of St. Patrick's Catholic Church. Father David gave us a short history of the church. The Church recently celebrated its 130th anniversary. The school was built in 1927 and currently has 250 students and is looking for land to build a new school. There are 1,400 families registered and approximately 4,000 members. St. Patricks is part of a five church mission, who supports the Hispanic Catholics through providing space for Hispanic Masses, CCD classes and more.

New members attending our meeting were introduced and asked what brought them to the meeting. (See list at end of minutes).

The Study Buddies, MYKE, Community Gardens of Chester County, After the Bell and Good Neighbors each gave reports of expanding and deepening their processes. They also told us about their successes in bridging with other similar life processes.

Bridging the Community members went caroling for the third year as promised, in spite of the rain on December 20, 1999.

Dr. Larry Bosley (former superintendent of Kennett schools) told us about his work with James Bond to reach the "have nots" in technology. He told us about the conference he will be heading involving a five state radius. Call 610-388-6682

Chief of Police, Albert McCarthy told us about the police department's idea of having two available computers in an open room off the back of the police station. They would like to provide support to individuals who do not have a computer at home.

Sue Yocum showed us the finished copy of her new educational book for elementary students entitled Let's go to a Pennsylvania Mushroom Farm. There are 2,000 copies printed and there will be a reception at the Bayard Taylor Memorial Library on January 27, from 5:30 to 7:30 pm.

Bob Holliday, SCC recruiter for Census 2000 strongly urged everyone to get the word out about filling out the census paper that arrives at each home. He pointed out that Southern Chester County has been greatly under-reported. He reinforced the idea that The Census Bureau is dedicated to confidentiality and technologically has a totally walled off system from all other government programs. He provided materials and spoke to people at the time we had our bridging discussion.

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burden and no funding for the overall Bridging process.)

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Before our meeting began, Joan Holliday announced that *Bridging the Community* has completed a healthy three-year cycle; the community has embraced it as an essential model for community regeneration. She announced that we will now move from Joan Holliday and Anita O'Connor co-facilitating the process to two new community members. Clarke Green and Ryan McCloud will co-facilitate for a spell and then we will look for others. The idea being: *Bridging the Community* is a pure community process and not identified with certain people; it belongs to all of us and each of us can share the roles to make it happen. Our guidance for staying on track is our framework and our princples.

Our meeting began with an invocation by Margaret Valentine, Founder and Director of His Mission. Peggy Brock gave a report on the history of His Mission. It is a non-profit corporation which operates a soup kitchen and shelter for the needy and homeless. It started in October of 1986 as an extension of a soup kitchen that was held at Bethel Church. A fire destroyed the building in 1996 and it was rebuilt with operations resuming in November of 1997. In 1999, His Mission fed 30,000 people meals and provided 10,000 bed nights. They also provide clothing for needy children, assist people in locating permanent homes and help jobless people find work. They provide transportation to hospitals and jobs. Alcoholics Anonymous meetings are held at the facility weekly and other types of community service work are provided.

New members attending our meeting were introduced and asked what brought them to the meeting. (See list of names at end of minutes).

Following are the items discussed for revitalizing our community:

- l. Sarah Green, the new Volunteer Coordinator from LaComunidad Hispana introduced herself and said that she would like to generate volunteers for inside the agency and for outreach programs.
- 2. Mary Flores, chair for Relay for Life for the team started three years ago, *Community Committed Caring* introduced herself and asked for volunteers for the Cancer 24 hour walk on June 17&18, 2000.
- 3. Pastor Navarro presented Joan Holliday with a decorative plate from Mexico for being his community friend. He stated that "I would like to be part of the community just as all of you." Joan accepted the plate on behalf of the community as an expression of the "Hispanic dancing energies" that enrich our town.
- 4. Sue Yocum presented the *Read Across Kennett* program to be held on June 5, 2000 from 5pm to 7pm. The community is invited (mentors, teachers, parents, volunteers, police etc.) to walk to three different sites; the Library, Presbyterian Church and the YMCA to read with the kids. Participants will read for one-half hour and then walk to the next site. (Mary D. Lang, New Garden and Greenwood are participating).
- 5. Linda Mackey-Greig introduced herself as heading up a non-profit organization. Her organization recycles new building materials that otherwise would be wasted and distributes them where needed.
- 6. Nancy Clegg from The Presbyterian Church told us about Friday Buddies where students have a dinner cooked by Bob Walton and then play games or do art and drama projects with adults and their "buddies". They teach values and give hope and encouragement.
- 7. Claire Russell reported that the ESL classes are growing rapidly. She encouraged us to dispel the myth that Hispanic people are unwilling to learn the English language. Her students were unable to attend due to final classes. She will share the community's goodwill. Claire also thanked Mr. Karkosac for opening up the school buildings for classes We sang "Happy Birthday" to Anita O'Connor for her 50th.
- 8. Loretta Perna brought two middle-school and one high-school Migrant Education students to experience the "joy of community".
- 9. Officer Bob Clark from New Garden said he is a visible figure in New Garden Elementary and runs a Gang Prevention Program (It includes the DARE process and goes broader). He has 200 bicycle helmets that he can give away free on May 13, 2000 from 11 am to 2 pm at New Garden Elementary.

- 10. Ryan McCloud celebrated the county-wide outstanding project award given by USA today and Daily Local for Kennett Youth's *Colors of Kennett* Make A Difference Day Project. Ryan, Emily Thomforde and Hayden Olenik explained the dimensions of the project.
- 11. Sue Monroe, Chair of Chester County Futures spoke about the success of the program and would like more mentors. She praised Elizabeth Rhoades for her success in helping her student receive acceptance into Immaculata college.
- 12. Councilman, Rich Pesce spoke about the need for more drivers for the Food Cupboard because the good news is that Entemanns bakery has doubled their donation to the community.
- 13. Jay McGinley from West Chester expressed an interest in doing his counseling internship in this area, working with parents of young children.
- 14. Reverend Dennison spoke about the importance of "bridging" and that his church supported the Study Buddies and saw the need for everyone to become involved. His family has been around the Kennett area for over fifty years.
