It is supported by 13 Host Churches that provide a week of volunteers four times a year. They have 15 Support Churches who partner with the Host Churches. Volunteers set-up the beds, provide an evening meal and stay over-night with the guests at the church. The families are transported to the Day Center for the day at 1156 W. Baltimore Pike, Kennett Square, PA 19348. A Case Manager works with families to help them find housing, employment and support to gain stability. They also mentor families after they leave the program.

During COVID the 4 homeless families were first in a Delaware Hotel, then a benefactor in Kennett provided free hotel rooms for 9 months. Currently, because of COVID, Family Promise **Joan Holliday** spoke about the editorial that Pastor Dan had written about Pastor Marvin T Williams celebrating his 30 years as a pastor. We applauded this significant community contribution.
